Activities and Accomplishments

Dr. Billy Earnest presented "Lying and Deception" as part of a panel, *Active Listening, Conflict Resolution and Communication: A Multidisciplinary Approach to Examining Conflicting Listening Schemas*, at the International Listening Association conference in Vancouver, British Columbia. He also presented "We Lie!" as part of a panel, *Cross-Talk: Communicating Across Differences in an Era of Polarization and Paranoia*, at the March 2019 Southern States Communication (SSCA) conference (Montgomery, Alabama).

In other news, **Billy** was a contributing speaker for a pilot digital redesign of CMS 333T: Communication for Engineering Majors (collaboration between UT-Austin schools: Cockrell School of Engineering and Moody School of Communication).

Dr. Teresita (Tere) Garza served as a reviewer of conference submissions for the 2019 NCA conference. She reviewed for the Rhetorical Theory Division and the Latino/Latina Communication Studies Division.

Tere received a St. Edward's University 20 years of Outstanding Service Award; she was also awarded a Scholarship, Pedagogical Innovation, Creative Expression (SPICE) Award for 2019-2020.

Dr. Stephen King (co-author Dr. Roger D. Gatchet, West Chester University—Pennsylvania) presented a competitively selected essay, "Rhetorical Residencies: Civil Rights Homes as Metonymic Public Memory," at the 2019 Eastern Communication Association conference (Providence, Rhode Island). This essay received a Top Faculty Paper Award from the Rhetoric and Public Address Division.

Stephen also reviewed seven manuscripts for two NCA Divisions: African American Communication and Culture and Rhetoric and Public Address. He continues to serve on the editorial board of the interdisciplinary journal *Rock Music Studies* and is a member of several professional organizations including NCA. **Stephen** was awarded a SPICE for 2019-2020.

In April, **Dr. Innes Mitchell** presented the essay, "Leaving Neverland: The Transformative Role of Graphic Narrative in Recovering the Forgotten Memory of Slavery in Scotland," at the Popular Culture Association/American Culture Association Conference in Washington D.C.



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Innes also received his 25-year Service Award at St. Edward's University in March 2019. **Innes** was awarded a SPICE for 2019-2020.

Dr. Lori Peterson's (and co-editor Christine E. Kiesinger—independent scholar) edited book on narration and negotiating midlife was published in the spring:

Dr. Nancy Reiter-Salisbury presented, "Active listening, Conflict Resolution, and Communication: Through the lens of Social Media," at the International Listening Association conference. She was also elected to the organization's Nominating Committee.

In March, **Dr. Teri Varner** presented the peer-reviewed essay, "The Performance of Speaking Out & Listening In: Case Studies from the Classroom" at the 40th Annual International Listening Convention. In April, **Teri** presented "We Don't Listen!" on the panel *Cross-Talk: Communication Across Differences in an Era of Polarization and Paranoia*, at the SSCA conference.
